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*Buddhist Fury* - Michael K. Jerryson 2011-07-28

Buddhist violence is not a well-known concept. In fact, it is generally considered an oxymoron. An image of a Buddhist monk holding a handgun or the idea of a militarized Buddhist monastery tends to stretch the imagination; yet these sights exist throughout southern Thailand. Michael Jerryson offers an extensive examination of one of the least known but longest-running conflicts of Southeast Asia. Part of this conflict, based primarily in Thailand's southernmost provinces, is fueled by religious divisions. Thailand's total population is over 92 percent Buddhist, but over 85 percent of the people in the southernmost provinces are Muslim. Since 2004, the Thai government has imposed martial law over the territory and combatted a grass-roots militant Malay Muslim insurgency. *Buddhist Fury* reveals the Buddhist parameters of the conflict within a global context. Through fieldwork in the conflict area, Jerryson chronicles the habits of Buddhist monks in the militarized zone. Many Buddhist practices remain unchanged. Buddhist monks continue to chant, counsel the laity, and accrue merit. Yet at the same time, monks zealously advocate Buddhist nationalism, act as covert military officers, and equip themselves with guns. *Buddhist Fury* displays the methods by which religion alters the nature of the conflict and shows the dangers of this transformation.

**Women who Live in Two Worlds** - Montira Junnawatt 2021

This study was based on inspiration from the well-known stories of fourth-century Roman women who sought to embrace a life of Christian asceticism. These aristocratic women were seeking the angelic life - while their families desired "good daughters" who could fulfill family obligations through marriage and childbearing (and keeping wealth in the family). The clash between their desire to be "good disciples" of Jesus Christ on the one hand, and "good daughters" meeting family and social expectations on the other, led to challenges to which these women sought solutions: some of them compromised and delayed their religious impulses; some negotiated with their families; some transformed villas into monasteries. These stories challenged me to consider the situation of women in Thailand who came from non-Christian families but then converted to Christianity. What sorts of family and social expectations did they face, and what sorts of conflicts, negotiations, and compromises did they make as they sought to respond to a call to follow Jesus Christ? To respond to this, the present study examines the stories of eight Thai women, from different backgrounds (Chinese religion, Thai and Lao Buddhism), who converted to Christianity between the years 1984 and 2020. I have used the method of qualitative research and grounded theory to obtain and analyze my data from interviews with these women. The dissertation shows that these eight women faced opposition from their families in various ways, but yet sought to maintain family ties by seeking a kind of permission or acceptance from their families. These women related that becoming "a better one" through their conversion, whether in character, lifestyle choices and personal success, helped them gain acceptance from their families. In a context in which religion is often practiced in a "personal-cultivational modality" (Adam Yuet Chau), the women's striving through Christianity to be "a new person" produced changes that conformed to Thai Buddhist and Thai Chinese cultural values and were received positively. Thus the women were able to maintain the value of "family first" and seek the harmony of the family - and even to enhance it through converting their loved ones to the family of Christ.

Her responses reveal a penetrating understanding that helps to unravel and demystify the true nature of Buddhism. *Buddhism in the Light of Christ* also includes helpful suggestions on how to share Jesus with Buddhist friends, as well as important considerations regarding discipleship once a Buddhist has come to know Christ.

**Talk Thai** - Ira Sukrungruang 2011-01-25

On one side of the door, the rich smell of sweet, spicy food and the calm of Buddhist devotion; on the other, the strangeness of a new land. When Ira Sukrungruang was born to Thai parents newly arrived in the U.S., they picked his Jewish moniker out of a book of "American" names. In this lively, entertaining, and often hilarious memoir, he relates the early life of a first-generation Thai-American and his constant, often bumbling attempts to reconcile cultural and familial expectations with the trials of growing up in 1980s America. Young Ira may have lived in Oak Lawn, Illinois, but inside the family's bi-level home was "Thailand with American conveniences." They ate Thai food, spoke the Thai language, and observed Thai customs. His bedtime stories were tales of Buddha and monkey-faced demons. On the first day of school his mother reminded him that he had a Siamese warrior's eyes—despite his thick glasses—as Auntie Sue packed his Muppets lunch box with fried rice. But when his schoolmates played tag he was always It, and as he grew, he faced the constant challenge of reconciling American life with a cardinal family rule: "Remember, you are Thai." Inside the Thai Buddhist temple of Chicago, another "simulated Thailand," are more rules, rules different from those of the Southside streets, and we see mainstream Western religion—"god people"—through the Sukrungruang family's eyes. Within the family circle, we meet a mother who started packing for her return to Thailand the moment she arrived; her best friend, Auntie Sue, Ira's second mother, who lives with and cooks for the family; and a wayward father whose dreams never quite pan out. *Talk Thai* is a richly told account that takes us into an immigrant's world. Here is a story imbued with Thai spices and the sensibilities of an American upbringing, a story in which Ira practices English by reciting lines from TV sitcoms and struggles with the feeling of not belonging in either of his two worlds. For readers who delight in the writings of Amy Tan, Gish Jen, and other Asian-Americans, *Talk Thai* provides generous portions of a still-mysterious culture while telling the story of an American boyhood with humor, playfulness, and uncompromising honesty.
