it is often the case that the two concepts in combination do not receive equal weight, with security issues getting priority over development concerns. This is not desirable and actually undermines security in the longer term.

Moreover, there are major challenges in practice when security practitioners and development practitioners are asked to agree on priorities and work together. *Security and Development in Global Politics* illuminates the common points of interest but also the significant differences between security and development agendas and approaches to problem solving.
